County Clerk Register Deeds Listed As One

For the first time in Oakland County, when the voter goes to the polls on Nov. 3rd, he will find the title of County Clerk and Register of Deeds as one listing.

Daniel T. Murphy, Jr., incumbent Register of Deeds is running for re-election to the combined office. Murphy was appointed Register in May, 1956 by the late County Clerk, Lynn D. Allen, Prosecutor Fred C. Ziem and Probate Judge Arthur E. Moore.

Since Allen's death, several months ago, the Oakland County Board of Supervisors has taken legal action to combine the County Clerk's office with that of the Register of Deeds.

THE MOVE was recommended at that time because Murphy's office had developed a program of microfilming records which allowed a substantial saving annually in operating cost. It is planned that this method of recording documents can be extended to the vital statistics and court records as well. Murphy's previous experience includes five years of public service as a deputy county clerk under Allen. He also worked as a Circuit Court clerk assigned to Judge H. Russel Holland.

HIS INTEREST in civic affairs is exemplified by active participation in a United Fund divisional group, and executive board work of the Clinton Valley Council of Boy Scouts. He is treasurer of his Kiwanis Club, a past district commander of A.M.Y.E.T.S., a regular Sunday school teacher, and a delegate to the Pontiac community advisory council.

Murphy, a veteran of World War II, is a graduate of Pontiac public schools, and attended Wayne State University for five years. He and his wife, the former Carolyn Leddick, make their home in Pontiac with their four children.

Clean Windshields Residents Warned

Pedestrian traffic accidents are expected to rise now until the end of the year because of more hours of darkness and obscured vision due to bad weather, according to Chief of Police Ralph W. Moxley.

"Already I have seen cars with their windshields or back windows obscured by frost or heavy dew," Chief Moxley said. "Persons who leave their cars out overnight can expect to find them darkly coated each morning. Unless they take the time to clean their windows they will not only be violating the law, but they will be increasing the possibilities of being involved in an accident."

Chief Moxley pointed out that some drivers clear their windshields but don't take the time to clean their rear windows.

"You can't drive with safety in Birmingham traffic without being able to see out your rear window," he said. "The good driver looks frequently at his rear view mirror to see what traffic behind him is doing."

The inclement weather will be getting from now on coupled with more hours of darkness increases tremendously the traffic hazards, particularly for pedestrians, Chief Moxley asserted.

"Pedestrian fatalities and serious injuries start to rise at this time of the year and maintain a high level until the end of the year," he said. "That is why we are advising drivers that 'Darkness Hides Walkers' and to be doubly careful during hours of darkness."

Chief Moxley said that police officers had been alerted to watch out for motorists driving with vision obscured. This is a violation of the law and police have been directed to take the necessary action, he said.

Troy Again Asks Birmingham for Utility Services

Before a proposed 11 residences can be built on Westboro in Troy, Birmingham city officials must decide whether to serve the new buildings with water and sewer facilities.

Troy City Manager C. R. Lukens made the request on behalf of the Astron Co. of Oak Park. The property lies immediately north of Birmingham, east of Adams road.

Birmingham City Manager L. R. Gare has been asked to study the petition and recommend action.

Birmingham policy has been to deny requests for service outside the city. However, there are compelling factors in this particular triangular section of Troy which has seen these two services extended by Birmingham.

Won't Press Further for Higher Zoning

Birmingham will "hope for the best" in the remaining development of a triangular parcel west of Eton and north of Maple.

The city fought to keep the previous single family zoning all the way to the state supreme court—and lost. It was made a commercial zone by a circuit court injunction.

However, 70 per cent of the triangle has developed with multiple dwelling units, so city officials will just to lock the remainder will develop the same way.

The city's legal counsel said there is a "good chance" the injunction could be modified to permit only multiple dwellings on the final 21 per cent of the property.
