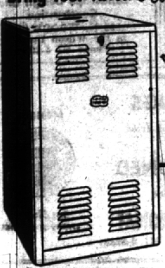

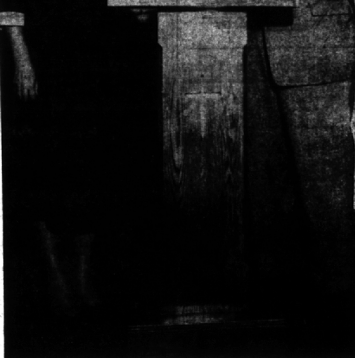

Kinshary, chairman of the executive committee; James Macdonald, chairman of the Board of Christian Education; and the Rev. Mr. Gentile has long been associated with school and church groups in the Detroit area. Educated in Detroit public schools, he also is a graduate of Wayne State University and holds a master's degree from Northwestern University.

Before his present appointment, he served as associate pastor at Strathmore Methodist, from 1961 until 1958. Last spring he was twice honored by friends and associates. He was elected president of the Northwest Detroit Ministerial Fellowship, and fellow Kiwanians of the Strathmore Club gave him a distinguished service award for work with young people.

Mr. Gentile's previous service was with both Metropolitan and Central Methodist churches in Detroit, the Detroit public schools and Adrian College, where he served as vice president in charge of public relations from 1945 until 1951.

Men's Club To Hear Atomic Power Talk

"Atomic Power at Lagoona Beach" will be the title of a slide presentation dealing with Enrico Fermi atomic power plant scheduled for the Wednesday, Oct. 22, meeting of the Community Congregational church men's club.

Myron C. Beakman, director of nuclear power development for Detroit Edison will be the speaker. He will discuss his company's work in the development and planning of an atomic reactor to be used in the production of electricity. This breeder type reactor, is being designed by Atomic Power Development Associates, Inc. of which Detroit Edison is a member.

The plant is now under construction near Monroe and, subject to Atomic Energy Commission approval, is scheduled to be put into operation in 1960.

The dinner meeting will be held at the church, 11 1/2 Mile road and Southfield, and is scheduled to begin at 6:30 p.m.
