Builders Told To Build Better Ditches, Culverts

FRANKLIN—Franklin village officials closed ranks Monday night to strengthen control over builders who fail to comply with culvert and ditch requirements. Ordinances were placed on temporary occupancy permits.

A \$100 deposit made at the time the building permit is issued is held by the city to assure debris is cleaned up, code requirements are met, culverts installed and ditches properly graded.

Failure to comply with the culvert code constitutes a building code violation, the council agreed, and builders will be given 90 days to correct violations before the village uses all or part of the permit deposit to have the necessary work done.

The council also agreed that the building department will not issue further temporary occupancy permits until all phases of the building requirements are met, including final approval of the street administrator.

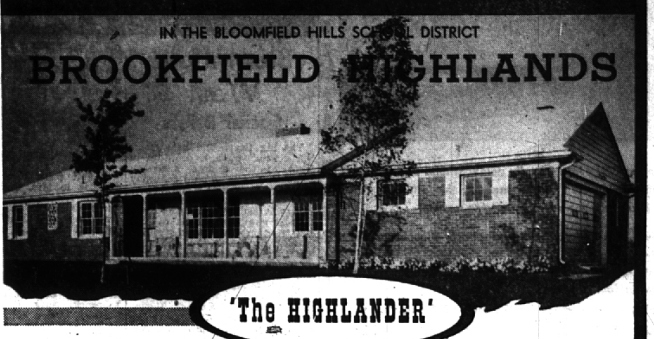
Franklin Village council meets the second Monday of the month at 8 p.m. at the Youth room of the Franklin Community church on Franklin road.

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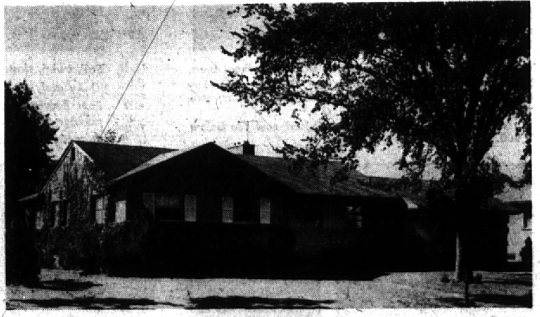
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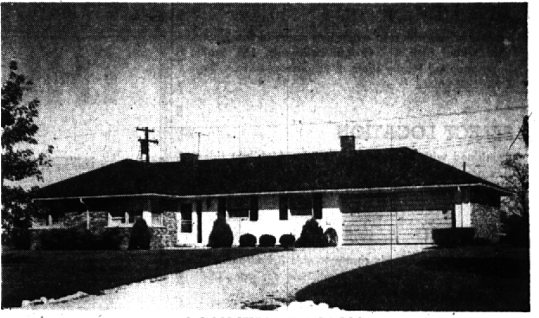
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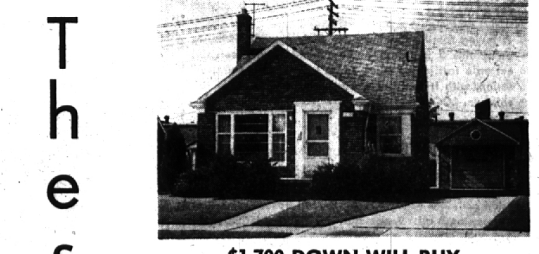
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
