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Pierce School's New Expanded Science Program

IT IS AN experimental program being tried out at Pierce and Harlan schools. Just one team of two teachers at the fourth, fifth and sixth grade level at each school are participating.

One teacher teaches 30 of the children English, spelling, reading, social studies, in the morning; while the other teacher teaches the other group mathematics and science; the classes are reversed in the afternoon.

THE TEACHERS, who teach their class courses, seem very enthusiastic and the mothers, too, feel that the children will get more concentrated instruction. The board of education plans to evaluate the program in two years and if the results are as favorable as they believe they will be, Birmingham school system will use it in all schools.
