LATHRUP—Recently returning from a two-month visit to West Berlin, Germany, Dr. Ursula Bielefuss tells of the many changes that have taken place in the country where she was born and formerly lived.

Modern new buildings now replace shabby of the war torn area, she and her husband remember so well. Dr. Ursula Bielefuss and her husband, Dr. Werner Bielefuss are both practicing dentists with an office in their home.

Both Drs. Ursula and Werner Bielefuss obtained dental degrees at the Universities of Berlin and Wurzburg as well as doctorates at the University of Berlin. Dr. Ursula also received a degree in criminology at the University of Berlin.

WHEN they came to the United States in 1949 they attended the University of Indiana in Indianapolis and obtained their American degrees there.

The Bielefusses have their lovely home at 18786 San Quentin fashioned in the European manner with a grand piano and a bookcase sectional from Germany which covers a complete wall. They are enjoying more of the furniture used in their former home in Germany brought over to complete their furnishings here.

YOUNG JURGEN, their 14-year-old son, is currently attending Southfield high school, where he is adding French and Latin to the list of languages he has mastered. When he first arrived here, Jurgen was just nine years old. His parents feared he might have some difficulty adjusting to a new school when he did not speak English. But in no time Jurgen was speaking like a true Yank.

His parents are very happy to have found a home here. They are thankful for the many opportunities offered and a new living that they have found so much to their liking.

The students who had paintings on exhibition were Karen Pfister, Janet Kahl, Gloria Exler, Sandra Wagner and Jennifer Waud.

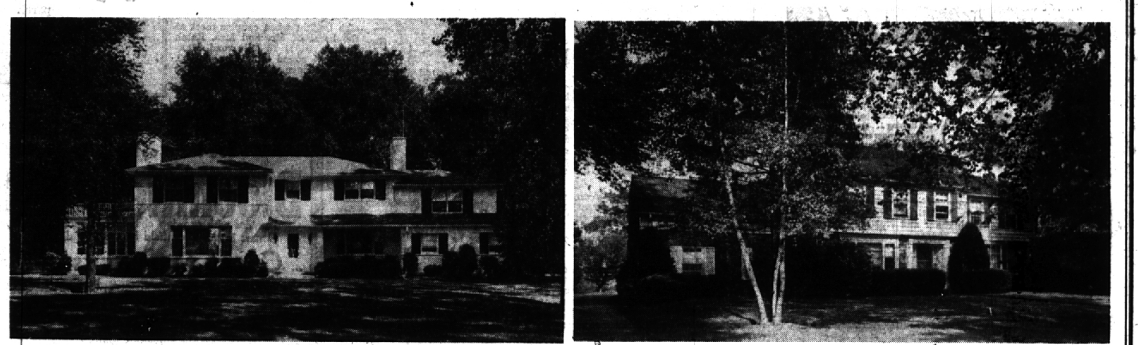

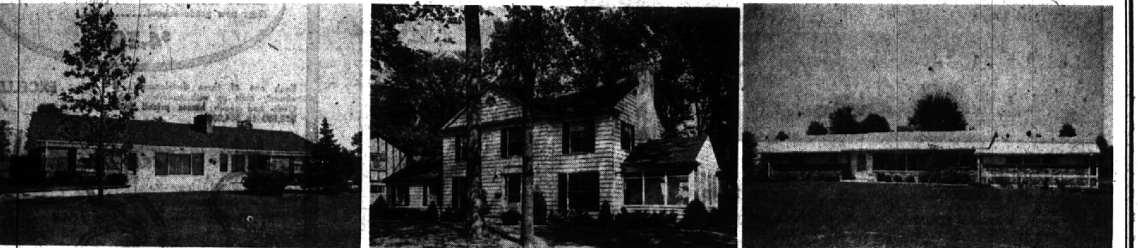
