The event, largest one-day dog show in the state and second largest statewide, is sponsored by the Progressive Dog club of Wayne County.

**FORESTRY SERVICE Offers Free Trees**

LANSING—Shipment of young trees from three state nurseries is under way and landowners are urged to order stock now for fall planting.

The Conservation Department's forestry division recently placed 18 million young trees on sale, including red pine seedlings and transplants and Jack pine seedlings. Prices vary according to age class and species.

Planting stock is sold at cost by state nurseries primarily for reforestation purposes. Trees may not be resold with roots attached or used for ornamental plantings.

A placard to Michigan Conservation department, Forestry Division, Lansing 26, will bring full details and order blanks.

**Week Free of Fires Sets State Record**

LANSING—Michigan recorded a perfect week in fire prevention during the period September 15-21 with no fires on state or private forests and grasslands.

To date this year, 1,195 fires have burned 9000 acres of state and private land throughout the state, excluding federal property.

A breakdown shows 268 fires in the upper peninsula burned 44 acres; 680 fires in the northern lower peninsula burned 1254 acres, and 177 fires in the southern lower peninsula burned 1802 acres.

The Southfield township board meets at 8 p.m. the second and fourth Tuesday each month at the Southfield township fire hall on 13 Mile road, west of Southfield road.

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
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
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
