

Moxley Wins First Place in Pistol Shoot

Birmingham police chief Ralph W. Moxley took first place among chiefs at the first annual South Oakland County Chiefs of Police pistol shoot last Friday.

Seven chiefs and 83 other police officers attended the shoot at the Birmingham police department range. The shoot was conducted by the Michigan State Police.

Moxley and patrolman Darryl Brunette, who took first place in the 200-yard pistol shoot, were awarded the class trophies.

Supreme Court Decision Affects Area Projects

A Michigan Supreme Court decision last week in effect upheld the constitutionality of an Oakland county department of public works project similar to the Evergreen interceptor and Twelve Years drain projects which will affect the Birmingham area.

But the court's split decision on the Farmington interceptor leaves issues not determined sufficiently. County DPW Director Harold Schone later told Birmingham City Manager L. E. Gore, Schone said a petition may be filed for an immediate rehearing.

Schone said that he is now advising for bids and taking other preliminary steps on the Farmington project to avoid delay when it is definitely known that bonds may be sold. (See related story on Page 1-B.)

Arthur W. Bull, Crash Victim, Still Critical

Still in critical condition at Grace Hospital, Detroit, following a plane crash Monday night is Arthur W. Bull, 36, of 2706 Broadway boulevard, Bloomfield village.

Bull underwent brain surgery following the crash, and was reported in a semi-conscious state Wednesday. He was a passenger in a "Seabee" plane that made an emergency landing in Mt. Olivet cemetery when its single engine failed on a routine landing at Detroit city airport.

Piloting the plane was Charles S. Wolf, 51, of Detroit, who was not seriously injured. Also suffering minor injuries in the crash was Bull's brother-in-law, Earl Morgan, 30, of Berkley.

The three men were returning from an afternoon of shooting near Port Sanilac.

BULL, president of the Michigan Wire Cloth company of Detroit, was still strapped in the plane when police and firemen rescued the wrecked plane among the tombstones. The craft did not catch fire.

Airport personnel theorized the plane may have run out of gas. "Seabees," termed by one airport spokesman as a "flying rock," were banded from the city airport two years ago. The ban was never enforced.

Congressman William S. Broomfield (R) announced this week that final approval has been given for the construction of a new parcel post annex and maintenance garage at the southeast corner of Commerce and Cole, Birmingham.

Broomfield said the completion date for the building to be constructed by the Jerome Building Co., Detroit is Dec. 1, 1938.

The new building will be constructed of brick and cinderblock, and will cover over 10,000 square feet. An additional 17,000 square feet will be provided for parking.
