according to Mayor Richard Cogger, if the ditch is dug through Cranford Village, but the petition stated clearly that the Lathrup residents want the drain commissioner to abandon his plan.

If the Rouge No. 1 drainage ditch is enclosed, it would cost \$312, compared with the \$77 per acre for the drain commissioner's present plan.

Charles D. Kelley, Lathrup subdivision, said Monday that it is possible to do a clean-out job on the stream for \$5,000. The cost is now \$2,000 more than quoted in 1956. The \$5,000 job would remove about two feet of collected silt from the stream bottom, and all the discarded ice boxes, ranges and barrels that choke the flow.

**JOHNSON SAID** that although petitions drawn by the drain commissioner's office could be held up in Lathrup, an identical set had been left for signatures of residents north of Lathrup. If enough signatures are secured from residents in the northern section of the drainage district, the plan can proceed.

Cogger asked the assembled residents if they were aware of what could happen to their property if the plan was carried out to the south of Lathrup. If enough signatures are secured from residents protesting the Rouge No. 1 project, told Cogger that each signer was completely informed when the petition was circulated.

At the suggestion of Councilwoman Elizabeth Mitchell, circulation of the drain commissioner's petition will be held up by the council until a conference can be held with City Attorney Everett Hayes and the drain commissioner.

Smith said. Twelve-foot fencing will surround the tennis courts, eight-foot around the stadium area, and four-foot elsewhere.

Exterior lights will be erected near the building, and others will illuminate the parking lot for night use.

**IN ANSWER** to Dr. Douglas A. Wood's question "as a taxpayer" about the cost of the new school, Smith said "I don't know why that building has become thought of as a glossy, expensive building, because it is not. Actually, the construction cost should run about \$14 per square foot, and it's going to be a lot of school for that."

Smith said the cost per square foot would probably be lower than that for Southfield and Bloomfield Hills high schools.

HE **DISAGREES** with the contention of Alex W. Leshkevich, of 2660 Amburst, an electrician, that the half-inch conduit for stadium electricity was poor economy.

Smith also told the council that application for a building permit would be made to the village.

Councilman Chester Guilmet commended Smith and the school board for the design of the school, which he termed "one of the most progressive looking schools I have ever seen."

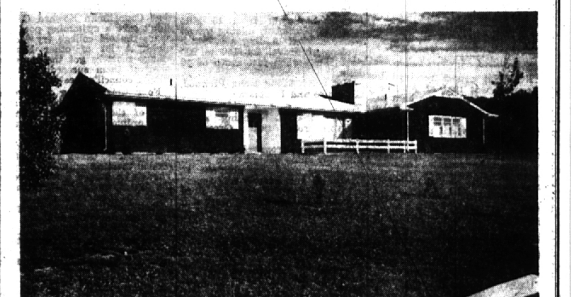
