

**Lathrup Minister Describes Origin Of New Association**

LATHRUP—"How the National Association Was Born" was the topic Tuesday of the Rev. John Rowe, minister of the Community Congregational Church of Lathrup, when he spoke at the fourth annual meeting of the national association of Congregational Churches in Detroit.

National prominent churchmen, 400 laymen and eighty attended the meetings which end today. Dr. George V. Bolshak, head of Wayne state university's department of speech, is moderator of the national association.

It was founded in Detroit Nov. 10, 1955. It's church constituency opposes merger with the Evangelical and Reformed church, now under consideration by the two denominations.
