

Music, Stories, Poetry Recorded for Kids

The world of children's records grows ever more exciting! Whether your child prefers music, stories, poetry or a combination of all three, something is offered that should please each young listener.

The firm of Casdon, which specializes in poetry and drama, has two new releases that cannot fail to entice the young listener—or, for that matter, the old. Show me anyone who can fail to be enchanted by Rudyard Kipling's "Just So Stories," as read by Boris Karloff. Karloff tells us the story of "How the Whale Got his Throat," "How the Camel Got his Hump" and "How the Rhinoceros Got his Skin" with loving care and complete adherence to the original text.

COLUMBIA also has a new recording of these same tales, done by Garry Moore with a somewhat garish musical obligato. As usual, the authentic rendering of these children's classics, as done by Karloff, comes off the best by far.

Others available in this fine series are "Mark and the Stories," done by Walter Brennan; "Grimm's Fairy Tales," read by Joseph Schildkraut; and "A Child's Garden of Verses," read by Judith Anderson.

COLUMBIA has issued a Captain Kangaroo record which adheres pretty much to the time-tested formula of his TV program, and "A Child's Garden of Verses," read by Judith Anderson.

Another fine Casdon release is the poetry of Mother Goose read by Cyril Pichard, Celeste Holm and Boris Karloff. This poetry—sometimes funny, oft-time quite grotesque, is charmingly presented again with no attempt to be condescending to the tastes of young audiences.
