The population is now over 1000 souls and the place is one of the healthiest in the whole state. For her honeymoon to Northern Michigan the new Mrs. Rodgers wore a leather and tweed olive green suit with matching accessories.

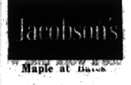

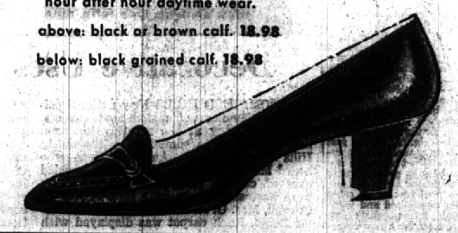
