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**CHRISTULIPMAS**

Now, just where do we begin to make this title mean something to you. There is a bit of an overlap here in that our CHRISTMAS OFFERINGS are underlying the more important problem of helping you to get Spring and Summer beauty into your garden with the least possible effort.

The warm weather has been more productive of golfing and hunting thoughts than of daffodil, tulip and lawn thoughts. Never-the-less, you will blame us if we don't try to keep you on the right track—so here we go again:—

UNUSED lawn seed should be sown after November 15th—not before.

TEN-SIX-FOUR (10-6-4), your regular lawn fertilizer makes an excellent decomposer for your compost pile. (It will even make a small dent in your own pile.)

SPADE the vegetable garden and leave the clods unbroken as frost kills soil insects and BREAKS DOWN CLAY. If you have no desire to turn under, use plenty of PEAT MOSS or GROUND CORN COBS.

Peat Moss—1 Bale to 125 sq. ft.  
Corn Cobs—50 lbs. to 100 sq. ft.

ROSES—Administer BONE MEAL; hill up with dirt about 8 to 10 inches, and ground is thoroughly frozen, mulch with MARSH HAY or PEAT MOSS.
