SOUTHFIELD — A private contractor has been hired to collect garbage and rubbish weekly in the City of Southfield. The city council decided last week to remain out of the South Oakland garbage and rubbish authority, and contracted with the Gus McCreedy trucking company, of Farmington. The firm will charge eight cents per home to the city.

McCreedy told the council he has five land fills, most of them in Novi township. His bid was 30 cents a home per year to dump at his own land fills.

Soapy Re-elected!

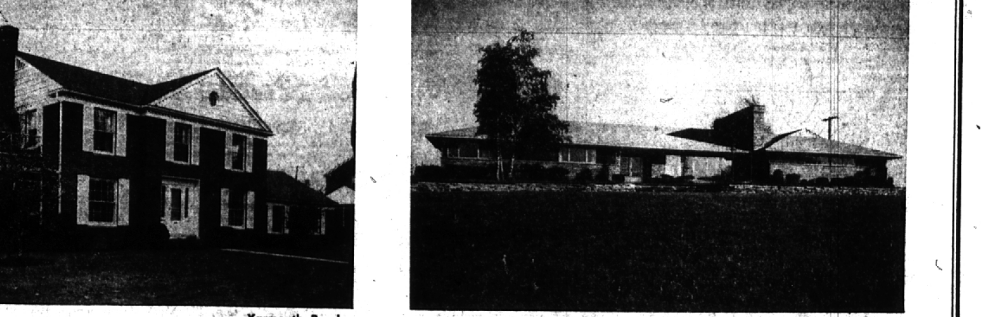

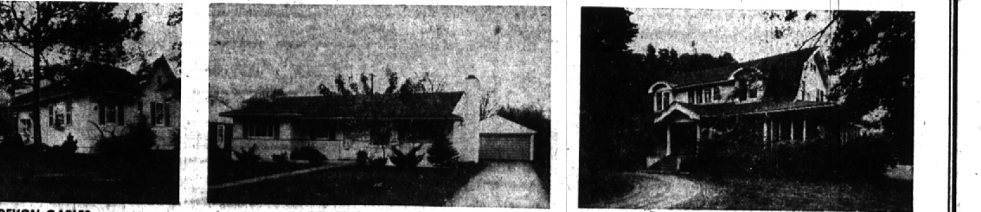
