village officials that Lathrup-EU township auditors were paving the way for a split of the township water department between the village of Westwood and the City of Southfield.

The voters would first have to approve the calling in of callable bonds and placing of non-callable bonds in escrow, with a report of councilmen concurred with Allerton's suggestion that the proposal be considered for placing on the ward's March election ballot.

Allerton suggested that the council give some thought to setting up and maintaining a village water department.

After Councilman Robert Reed's suggestion that the city should assume ownership of drain lines originally installed by subdividers to carry water away from individual homes.

The council ended the water and subdivider line matter by alerting Village Attorney Tom Dillon to expect to have a water proposal and a possible sewer proposal on the spring ballot.
