Michigan Celebrates LWV Day

Michigan pays tribute to the League of Women Voters, Sept. 18, proclaimed as "League of Women Voters Day" by the U.S. Congress.

Attending the luncheon at Devon Gables in celebration of "League Day" will be Leaguers from Birmingham—Mrs. Thomas Snelham, president of Birmingham League; Mrs. Atwell Smith, finance chairman; Mrs. George Talburt, special gifts chairman; Mrs. John Ericson, treasurer; Mrs. William H. THE LEAGUE of Women Voters is a non-partisan organization, which, since 1919, has been dedicated to the principles of self-government as established in the Constitution of the United States.

Its purpose is to promote political responsibility through informed and active participation of citizens in government, although in support of, or in opposition to, selected governmental issues. It does not, under any circumstances, support or oppose political parties.

ON THE 18th Mrs. Alexander A. Treuhart, a director of the LWV of the United States, will be the Michigan League's guest speaker at the luncheon at Devon Gables in celebration of "League Day."

SHARING the program with Mrs. Treuhart will be Irving Rose of Detroit. Rose is a graduate of the University of Michigan, and has a law degree from the University of Detroit.

His interest in the League was made known when he became a charter member of the Detroit League's Finance Advisory Committee. His talk will include new ideas to gain further community support of the principles and activities of the League.

Among the governmental issues supported by the LWV through the years have been child labor laws, permanent registration of voters, provision for child guidance clinics, the new Boys' Vocational school at Whitmore Lake, civil service, and equitable taxation.

ON THE LOCAL level, the Birmingham League has just finished a two year project of collecting material, editing publishing and distributing a booklet, "Know Your Town: Birmingham." After studies and consensus the Birmingham LWV supported the Civil Defense organization, measures to strengthen governmental services to children in Birmingham school district, and is conducting a library study.

The LWV has studied the Michigan Constitution intensively for over ten years and is among the non-partisan organizations which are working actively to secure a favorable vote in November on the calling of a State Constitutional convention.

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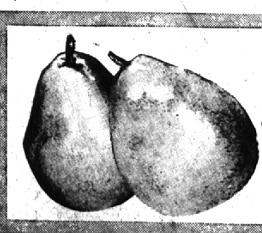
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
