

## Southfields O.K. Cost Split

The City of Southfield and Southfield township agreed this week to share costs of reconstructing old special assessment districts left over from township pre-incorporation days.

Southfield City approved the arrangement Monday night at the city council meeting. Southfield township acted on the apportioning Tuesday night at their board meeting.

Southfield will assume \$57,080.70 of the total assessed, while the township will pay \$175,105.80. The city and township special assessments must be separated as much as possible, according to Miss Clara Lane, treasurer of Southfield City. But, she told the council, it will be nine or 10 years before the assessments are all paid.

THE TOWNSHIP issued bonds

to finance special assessments, but when the city was formed, that share costs of reconstructing old special assessment districts left over from township pre-incorporation days.

Miss Lane told the council that a check for the city's share will go along with a township check.

## Paving Deadlines Are Shifted Again

LATHRUP—At the request of city clerk Gerald Stone, the city council again moved the deadline for paving petitions. The 1959 deadline will be Dec. 1, and the 1960 deadline has been moved ahead to Nov. 1.

There is a possibility that the 1958 paving program will be held up another month because the bond application has been delayed in Lansing.

Stone told council members that an office processing the application is 11 weeks behind with its work. Last year the office processed 705 applications. This year it is necessary to process 1,000 applications with a reduced staff.

VILLAGE OF WESTWOOD

ORDINANCE NO. 19

AN ORDINANCE TO REQUIRE DRIVERS OF VEHICLES OVERTAKING OR MEETING SCHOOL BUSES TO STOP, AND PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

The Village of Westwood Ordains:

Section 1.01. This Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "School Bus Stop Ordinance".

Section 2.01. The driver of a vehicle shall not overtake or meet and pass any school bus which has stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers.

Section 3.01. The driver of any vehicle overtaking or meeting any school bus which has stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers shall bring such vehicle to a full stop at least ten (10) feet from the school bus, and shall not proceed until the school bus resumes motion or the school bus driver signals to proceed or visual signals are no longer actuated. The driver of the school bus before resuming motion, shall signal stopped traffic to proceed and shall when resuming motion proceed in a manner as to allow congested traffic to disperse by keeping the bus as near the right side of the road as can be done with safety. Passengers crossing the road upon being discharged from a school bus shall cross in front of the stopped school bus.

Section 4.01. Any person who shall violate any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, be punishable by a fine not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars or imprisonment in the Oakland County jail for a period of not exceeding ninety (90) days or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the Court together with costs of prosecution.

Section 5.01. Sections of this ordinance shall be deemed to be severable and should any section or provision of this ordinance be declared by the Court to be unconstitutional or invalid, the same shall not affect the part not declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.

Section 6.01. The provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared to be immediately necessary for the preservation of public peace, health and safety and are hereby ordered to take effect immediately upon publication.



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
