Winter Recreation Program is Okayed At Southfield High

SOUTHFIELD—Permission for a winter recreation program to coincide with the Saturday swimming schedule at Southfield high school was granted Monday by Southfield's board of education.

Plans for a 12-week program were outlined to the board by representatives of the PTA Council recreation committee headed by Mrs. William Provencer.

Superintendent Glenn Schoen-hals reported that September enrollment was 6,556 compared to 6,185 last year.

Interest in the programs, facilities of the high school gymnasium will be available to all youngsters in the district Saturdays.

THERE will be no cost to the youngsters, many of whom already will be at the high school for swimming sessions. Instruction and supervision will be paid for by the PTA groups sponsoring the program.

Mrs. Provencer stressed to the board that the program will provide recreation for youngsters not expected enough to be playing on teams. She said the PTA group has been working closely with Monte Charles, high school physical education director, who has supervised the program for a year.

She mentioned that the recreation committee also has been working on a program for a similar program at elementary schools after hours. It also would like at least three ice rinks in the district.

SHE ASKED that the district "make a real effort" to install playground equipment already in the hands of the district. Glenn Schoenhals explained that this is being done by the maintenance staff as quickly as possible but that some play areas still are in the midst of site work which must be completed first.
