Key Kendall and Rex Harrison are proving once more that they are a comedy team without peer in the hilarious movie "The Reluctant Debutante", currently at the Michigan.

Audiences are literally caught in a stream of laughs which leaves them gasping for breath. Miss Kendall, always miraculously alighting, dances about, amid mad grimaces, from one situation to the next with unparalleled verve and stamina. Rex Harrison, always capable of sustaining every comic nuance, here bests his former performance. Which is no mean feat in itself.

The plot revolves around Mr. Harrison's daughter, by a former marriage to an American. Daughter comes to England for a visit and soon finds herself caught up in the exciting and confusing London "season." However, to Miss Kendall's dismay, the young lady, played ineffectively by Sandra Dee, falls not for any acceptable English lad with money and a title, but for an American dreamer, played in a wooden manner by the current junior heart-throb, John Saxton.

Youth Fined \$100 Ordered to Make Damage Restitution

An 18-year-old Bloomfield Hills youth, who led Birmingham police on a wild, bullet-strewn chase across the city early Sunday morning, pleaded guilty to reckless driving Monday before Municipal Court Judge Edward Emery.

Robert Roy Ridley, 340 Barden Lane, Bloomfield Hills, was ordered to pay a \$100 fine and make restitution for property he damaged in the flight across Birmingham and parts of Royal Oak.

The youth was arrested on Dorchester Road by Birmingham police officers Edmund Long and Donald Graham after an 80-mile-an-hour chase during which Long fired eight shots at the tires of the speeding car.

The chase started at 2 a.m. Sunday when the patrolmen noticed Ridley's car speeding on Quanton near Woodward.

When they attempted to stop the car by using their sirens and flashing red light, Ridley turned his lights out and raced away. He ran through stop streets and traffic
