When members of the Village Players and their guests attend the annual tea at the Playhouse on Sunday, Sept. 21, from 4 to 6 p.m. for the formal opening of their 36th season, most of the extensive improvements in the building and equipment undertaken during the past summer will be ready for inspection.

The enlarged stage is completely finished; the proscenium is now six feet wider, and stage depth has been increased four feet for a total

depth of twenty-five feet. All flats have been completely repaired and recovered. A new fireproof curtain and new leasers are being provided. Equipment for a completely new lights board is now being installed.

Future audiences at the Playhouse will also share in the benefits of this planning. Completely new, cushioned-seat chairs have been obtained and will be used for the first open show scheduled in October.

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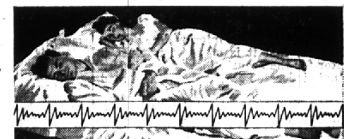


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
