Yearbook editors appointed at June are seniors, Elaine Couvra and Janet Gotberg. The yearbook is published annually.

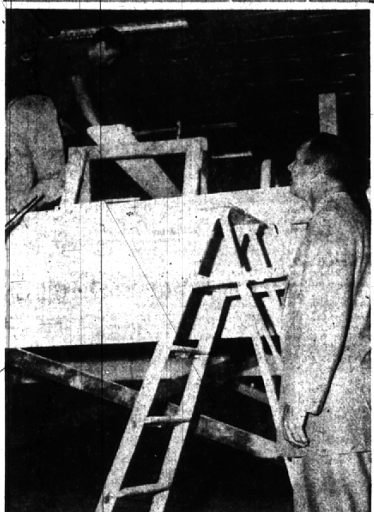
Southfield school teachers were honored at a tea given yesterday at Northbrook school by the Southfield Education association. School administrators and S.E.A. representatives also attended.

It seems to me that I have always lived here because you and my family make me feel like that. I have a new home with different customs, ideals and language, but I enjoy every minute I spend here and I really love them as much as my real family. I want first to tell you something about my country, that is, Argentina.

The Argentine Republic is situated at the south part of South America at the very point where the Pacific and the Atlantic oceans meet. Argentina's area is 1,079,065 square miles, and it has twenty million inhabitants. We have all the climates from tropic to arctic. The economy is based on agriculture and cattle raising.

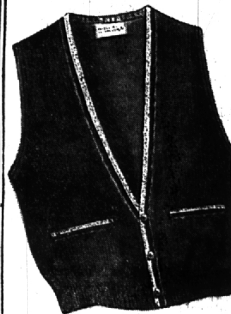
I LIVE IN Mendoza in the central and western part of Argentina by the Andes (a chain of mountains that runs along the western front of the country all the way from the north to the south and serves as a borderline between Argentina and Chile.

The sky is almost always blue and clear, so that rain and cloudiness are rare. Mendoza is famous for its grapes and olives. The area of Mendoza is 150,800 square km, and it has 700,000 inhabitants.

Now I want to tell you about my first impressions here in your lovely country. My first impression was of the happiness of all people, old, young and children. I always have found a smile on all faces. They are very friendly.

THERE ARE A LOT of differences with my country, Argentina. For instance I would like to tell you about one thing that I have heard all my new friends talk about since I came here—"dates." In my city or in all of Argentina, we can't go out alone with one

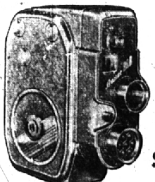

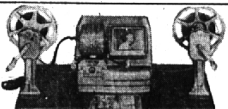
