Woops and Hoops Spark Annual Franklin Festivities

FRANKLIN — Indian dancers, marching bagpipers, a house show and an official hula-hoop contest are only some of the attractions that will highlight Franklin's annual Barbecue and Round-up this Saturday on the village green.

The Wunthe-Nong dancers from Iron Arber, who have performed in Michigan and Ohio under the leadership of Mr. and Mrs. A. Temple, will give authentic Chippewa ceremonial dances. The group is boys and girls, ranging in age from 14 to 18 and Steve Shown, an Ottawa tribesman. A narration on the meaning of steps in each dance will follow each hourly performance.

A w e r i n g hand-made costumes carefully duplicated from actual clothing, the dancers will offer easy-to-learn instructions in between the twenty-minute dances. Local youth will be invited to participate in the authentic Round Dance during the afternoon.

LEONARD LAWTON is in charge of the house show and 3 p.m. feature competition. Starting at 1:00 p.m. from the village green will be a parade of marchers which will include a Franklin Volunteer fire department and volunteer police force, public officials, decorated floats and a variety of old, new and unusual cars. The parade will be led by a kilted Scottish band group of 20 members of the St. Andrews society with Franklin's own medal-winning band, the "Scottish Claret".

A mid-way of 13 skill games will be offered youngsters by chairman Ralph G. Smith and Archie McCordell.

ALONG with other souvenirs of the day, Franklin's historian, Bert Wood will sell his 210-page "Franklin's Yesterday", just off the press, who will autograph them.

Special events chairman, Ray Adams has announced that arrangements have even been made for a Hula-hoop contest, time to be announced.

The open-pit barbecue dinner will be served from 4:30 to 7 p.m. bringing an end to the day's festivities which begin at 10 a.m. with an all-star little league baseball game on the diamond back of the Franklin Community church.

The council is awaiting an analysis from the engineer's office before final payment is made to Gordon.

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
