### Elmer Froehlich, Media Director

Elmer W. Froehlich, vice president and media director of MacManus, John & Adams, Inc., and widely known in the advertising profession, died Saturday at his home, 4534 Bishop road, Detroit, following a heart attack.

Mr. Froehlich, who was 59, had been a member of the advertising agency's staff since 1922. An acknowledged expert in his field, he had been chairman of the Advertising Research Foundation, and co-chairman of the Magazine & Farm Publications Chapter of the Association of American Advertising Agencies.

IN HIS YEARS with MacManus, John & Adams, Mr. Froehlich is believed to have directed personally the use of more advertising

expenditures than any other media executive in Detroit. Mr. Froehlich was a graduate of Wayne State university, then City college, and married Florence Stratmann in 1921.

Besides his wife, he is survived by four children, Mrs. Dolores Scherer, Elmer, Jr., Jerome and Mrs. Arlene Hawley; a sister, Elsie, and two brothers, George and Walter.
