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## Fashion Turns to Past And Era of Napoleon

Since much of the news about fall fashion revolves about the Empire theme, it is quite interesting to recall the era from which this particular style has come!

The name Empire is used to designate the period of classic revival in architecture, interior design, decoration and woman's dress. It was originated by Napoleon I.

During his period of consulate and rule in France (1804-1815), Napoleon sought to revive the luxurious majesty of imperial Rome.

FABRICS of that period in France were rich and elegant—stressing embroideries and lavish trims; brocades, laces, jeweled accents and luxury furs were used extensively.

Empire gowns (variations on the classic, early Roman dress), shawls and headresses were all patterned after those worn by the women of ancient imperial Rome.

Napoleon, too, sought to revive a greater interest in the cultural facets of life. Salons soon sprang up in the homes of the wealthy where the brightest minds in politics, literature and the arts were cultivated and catered to.

ONE OF THE leaders in this class of society was Madame Recamier. Married to one of France's wealthiest bankers, in spite of her youth (she was fifteen when she married Recamier, who was thrice her age) she held court for some of the brightest wits and greatest talents of that particular era.

One of these, was the painter Jacques Louis David, who had been court painter to Louis XVI, however, he supported the Republican cause during the French Revolution, and became painter to Napoleon in 1804.

One of his most famous portraits is that of Madame Recamier, painted while she was still in her teens. Her classic beauty, gentle coloring, style of hair dress are rendered with almost sculptural dignity. This beautiful portrait is in the Louvre Museum.

IT IS THIS very painting that has helped inspire the "Recamier" renaissance of 1958 fashions.

Another painting by David has also helped give inspiration to our newest fashions in the Empire theme.

David's portrait of Mademoiselle Charlotte Duval d'Ognes, now in New York's Metropolitan Museum, shows a young woman in a long gown of draped, sheer fabric, cased high above the waist, her hair piled rather high, yet with a studied casualness! ... The total look — Empire past and so suggestive of — Empire present!

Again, fashion takes inspiration from a period of history rich in romance and color — to prove that there's nothing really new under the fashion sun — only variations or the classic themes.
