

Walnut Lake Estates To Close Club House

WALNUT LAKE—A decision to close the Walnut Lake Estates club house Sept. 27-28 and store the equipment was arrived at Sunday at the fall general meeting of the association. New board members were elected and a measure putting "tenth" in deed restrictions was passed.

The 53 members attending the meeting of Walnut Lake Estates, Inc. elected three new board members for a three-year term.

Elected were Mrs. Jack Bek, Julian Orfanstein and Mrs. Elliott Oakwood. George Mackay was elected to fill the unexpired term for Andre Cillens.

The four will join six other board members at a meeting Oct. 20 to elect officers. The session will be held at the home of board member John Bell at 5470 Putnam drive. Others on the board are Russell Rowe, Marvin Mallis, Ray Embach, John Walker and Forrest Foster.

THE BOARD of directors have represented at all township meetings to keep constant check on sanitation, zoning restrictions, improvements and the township financial status.

Walnut Lake Estates, Inc. have offered their facilities for the use of all community projects. Orfanstein said he felt the biggest accomplishment was that during the association's ten-year history no member has been required to pay more than \$100 for all of the resulting benefits.

A MOTION was passed "That there be set aside from the general fund an escrow fund to be used by the board of directors for legal fees in the event it is necessary to bring civil suit against any property owner in the subdivision who violates any clause of the deed to his property."

The association feels this will put "tenth" in any further legal action deemed necessary.

A tenth anniversary history of the association was compiled and read by Julian Orfanstein, recounting accomplishments of the association since its organization March 4, 1948.

ON MAY 2, 1948 the first meeting of the organization now known as Walnut Lake Estates, Inc. was held with 40 members present. Last year the paid membership totaled 175, Orfanstein said.
