Speaking under the auspices of the college alumnae of Barnard, Bryn Mawr, Mount Holyoke, Radcliffe, Smith, Vassar and Wellesley, the proceeds from the world-famed rocket expert's performance at 8:30 p.m. will be used for general educational purposes and to provide scholarships to send Michigan girls to the seven colleges.
