

Don A. Wells Resigns Woodcreek Road Post

WOODCREEK FARMS — Richard Norwall was appointed new road administrator of Woodcreek Farms village Tuesday night, following the resignation of Don A. Wells.

After serving about 14 months, Wells turned over his records for the 5.19 miles of village roads he has administered since incorporation in 1967. Wells' tenure was about par for the course in small home-rule villages, where the headaches are many.

Councilman Dr. Zar Reader drafted a letter to Wells expressing the council's appreciation of his service, noting the high standards village roads have attained in his term of office.

BUT WELLS' EXIT was not exactly an accolade of roses. The council, reviewing road accounts, criticized the spending of about \$800 more for road maintenance than was formerly authorized by the council.

It was generally agreed that the new administrator, resident J. D. Downen and Doyle Tippet, will share the responsibility of road administration, the council decreed Tuesday.

Norwall was named assistant road administrator to Wells in July of 1967, but had never been called on to aid him. Norwall, who has been active in community affairs for about ten years, lives at 2782 Wellington.

Wells appeared briefly Tuesday night to submit his resignation, stating his business demanded 16 hours a day and he could no longer devote time to the road job.

Dr. Stebbins said he felt he did not have the time required for the committee work.

Mayor Richard Cogger told temporary committee chairman Tom Reed that he would hurry to find a replacement.

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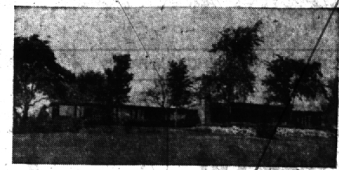
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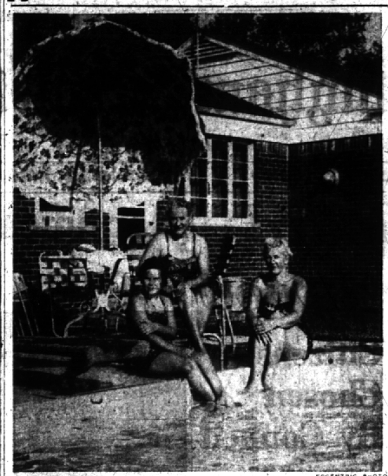

The tower was a newly developed, highly sensitive type, Sura explained. Just that day Boley had talked to three continents and nine countries through his new antenna. The size or shape cannot be modified without limiting the tower's performance, Sura said.

SURA TOLD the council that by Sept. 15 he could show pictures of soft towers in use in "some of the best neighborhoods in the country." He cited ham radio operators' service and value in times of defense and weather emergencies.

Boley, whose wife is also a "ham," told The Birmingham Eclectic he had spent "at least \$100" to build the new tower.

Boley's neighbor, Shepherd, told the council he considered the tower no more unsightly than a clothesline or a garage.
