Schools represented at the meeting will be Berkley, Van Dyke, Farmington, Walled Lake, Waterford, Pontiac Northern and Southfield.

Roger Soucy, Southfield mathematics instructor has been awarded one of the 828 Summer Fellowships for Secondary School Teachers of Science and Mathematics. It was announced this week by the National Science Foundation in Washington, D. C.

The fellowship will enable Soucy to attend summer study programs at any American college or university with tuition, fees, travel and dependency allowances paid by the foundation.

Four-year math scholarships to any Michigan college or university have been won by two Southfield high seniors.

Lee Sclar and Jerry Liebler were among the fifty top qualifiers in the Michigan Mathematics Competition held recently throughout the state. Over 8,000 students took the tests, sponsored by the University of Michigan and various industrial groups.

Both students are members of the Southfield high's math seminar, in which 13 of the school's top senior math students, get advanced training. The group is currently doing work in differential and integral calculus usually given to college sophomores.

Voters at Southfield high's Student Council polls May 1 will be taking part in a rather "different" election.

The students will be voting to elect Council officers as usual, but the candidates on the ballot won't be running for specific offices. Rather, they will be running simply to be selected as one of eight finalists for the Council's four of five posts.

"After the student body picks what they consider to be the eight best candidates," said Student Council sponsor Richard Fishbeck, "those candidates will vote among themselves to pick a president, vice president, secretary and treasurer."

"We've had too many 'personality polls' in the past," Fishbeck pointed out, "and we've lost too many good people who have been noosed out in close elections. We don't pick parties, we try to get the best students in office. This way, the voters will be electing eight good candidates."

Representatives to the council will be elected in the usual manner, popular vote by classes.
