The Barnum school science department is planning a science fair to be held in the cafeteria in the middle of April. Projects in the biological or physical fields may be entered by any Barnum student. Students in Mr. Radloff's ninth grade classes are expected to enter projects as part of their grades.

In addition to teaching vocal music, Mr. Seebach plays the piano and a stringed instrument.

The first track meeting of the season was held on Mar. 25 in the Barnum gym. Coach Stoll said he was pleased with the turnout. Practice will start at 3:30 on Wed., Apr. 8, at Pierce field.

The running events are the 50, 75 and 100-yard dashes, the 70-yard high hurdles, the 100-yard low hurdles, 200-yard shuttle relay, the 400-yard hurdle relay, and the 400-yard relay. The field events are the shot put, pole vault, high jump and the broad jump. Each boy is allowed to compete in three events, but only two may be running races.
