at the time the original building was planned.
The addition will bring pupil capacity from the present 600 to 900 and cost per pupil for the total project will be \$100. Comparable junior high buildings, MacMahon said, have cost \$1,500 and more per pupil.

THE \$100,000 budget saving represents "a substantial saving to the taxpayers," MacMahon added.
The architects have received five major awards for the design of the junior high building.

Contractors are J. C. Nielsen company, general; Vols plumbing and heating; mechanical; and Paul's electric company, electrical.

Already existing subdivision restrictions on fences will take precedence over the village regulations.

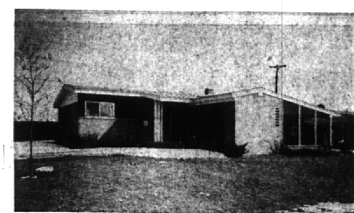
