### Garbage, Rubbish Ordinance Passed In Southfield

SOUTHFIELD—A new garbage and rubbish collection ordinance went into effect last week in Southfield.

Residents must put all garbage in 10 to 20 gallon metal containers with handles. The garbage must be wrapped in paper.

Rubbish must be kept dry and collected in a container until pickup time.

Newspaper, magazines and cardboard cartons must be tied in bundles.

Wooden crates and boxes must be disassembled and stacked in piles no larger than 3 x 3 x 4 feet.

**THE ORDINANCE** prohibits burning garbage in an open air incinerator and burning leaves, grass or rubbish on paved surfaces.

It states that no refuse can be burned within a 15 foot limit of a building and cannot be left unattended.

Violators of the ordinance will be subject to a fine of not more than \$500 or 30 days in jail or both.

### Southfield Accident Fatal to RO Man

SOUTHFIELD — A collision at 12 Mile road and Everett, Southfield, was fatal last week to an 82-year-old Royal Oak man.

John W. Corcoran, 2111 Clawson street, Royal Oak, died at Beaumont hospital, Seymour St. Stamp, 17, son of Richard Stamp, Foss Lake Trailer park, 3000 Southfield road, was the driver of the car that struck Corcoran.

According to Southfield police, Stamp was absolved of blame Thursday at the Oakland county prosecutor's office.


