

**Franklin Road Money Assigned**

FRANKLIN—Based on plans and specifications of Giffels Engineering company, consultants hired to put Franklin's eight-mile road program on the road, bids for work to be done at three critical spots and the season's dirt control program will be received and opened April 27 at 8 p.m.

Vital culvert work and drainage correction will begin at Wing Lake and Susanne roads, Wallingford and Willinggreen, and Rosemond court at Rosemond drive, the council agreed Monday night.

Bids for about 75,000 gallons of liquid calcium chloride to treat Franklin's 2 1/2 miles of dirt roads, major and local, were also urged by councilman William Worcester. However, treatment may be held off until after May 1, and a probable rainy season.
