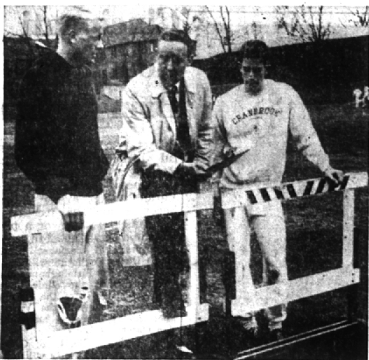

Wake Up—Anglers! Season Opens Soon

LANSING, April 16—Guaranteed to arouse many sportsmen from their spring fever lethargy—sometimes worsened when spring cleaning chores are at hand—is the opening of trout season.

During this year's April 25-September 13 season, more than 25,000 fishermen are expected to test their angling skills in such streams as the Au Sable, Manistee, Pere Marquette, Boardman, Sturgeon, Black, Rifle, Escanaba and Ontonagon.

MICHIGAN boasts about 36,350 miles of fishing streams to say nothing of its countless trout lakes.

If you belong to this sporty outdoor set, chances are that one of every three or four trout you catch in streams this season will be a fish that was planted from Conservation Department hatcheries.

Last year, Department employees planted more than 2,500,000 trout in public waters—approximately 1,000,000 were legal size. Normally, these plantings add about one-third or one-fourth to the catch of the wild fish from Michigan streams.

A&A Asphalt Grabs 7th In Tourney

Birmingham's A & A Asphalt team nearly upset the apple cart in the American Bowling Congress tournament at St. Louis Monday night. The unheralded squad went into the final game with more than enough pins to grab first place from Detroit's pre-empting Pfeiffer squad.

A POOR 950 game in the final match spoiled their chance and the team finished seventh with a 3104 total. Pfeiffer set a new record and continues to hold first place in the tournament with a 3243 series. The loss was started off with a 1071 series and improved to 1083 in the second game, but splits and fairs caused their downfall in the finale.
