

\$9,000 in Bonds Taken From Home

A 500-pound safe containing \$9,000 in government bonds and an undetermined amount of stocks was taken from a Birmingham home this week.

Birmingham Det. Richard Chambers said the burglars rolled the safe out the front door of a home belonging to Elmer Kapke, 1235 Brookwood, sometime Monday night.

Kapke, his wife and son have been visiting relatives in Milwaukee since Saturday.

A 17-inch portable TV set, an RCA three-speed record player and 24 bottles of expensive liquor also were taken.

THE SAFE, bottom ripped out and contents removed, was found by police alongside Edgewood in Beverly Hills yesterday morning.

Chambers said entry to the house was gained by breaking a window on a side porch. He said the entire house was ransacked including the kitchen cupboards. The liquor was removed from a basement cupboard.

The burglary was discovered Tuesday at 5 p.m. by a neighbor. Mrs. A. E. Wilson, 1256 Brookwood, noticed the open front door and called police.

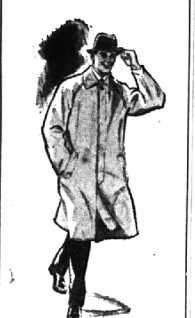

superintendent at Sault Ste. Marie. Mrs. Cornelia Robinson, (D), of Hamlet, and Charles G. Burns, (R), of Alcona county, are seeking election to the state board of education.

FRANK MERRIMAN, Deckerly dairy farmer, and Arthur R. Roose, Boyce City businessman, are Republican candidates for the state board of agriculture. They will be opposed by Washburn farmer Warren M. Hoff and Perry retired farmer Earl H. Bjornsteth, both Democrats.

Candidates for the six-year term of the WSU board of governors include Melvind E. Bleich, Detroit advertising executive, and Mrs. Jean F. McKee, Grand Rapids attorney. Democrats: Benjamin D. Burdick, Detroit attorney, and Edward G. Durance, Midland county's assistant prosecutor, on the Republican ticket.

Dr. Warren B. Cooksey, Detroit doctor, and Albert B. Channault Sr., Detroit builder, head the Republican ticket for the four-year WSU board of governors.

THEY WILL BE opposed by Dearborn doctor Michael Perence, Jr., and union leader Leonard Woodcock of Grosse Pointe, Democrats.

OAKLAND COUNTY circuit court incumbents Clark J. Adams, William J. Heer, and J. Russel Holland are seeking re-election to one of the five open benches.

Opposing them and running for the remaining vacancies are seven candidates.

James C. Allen of Birmingham, Wendell Brown of Farmington township, Milton F. Cooney, Stanton G. Dondoro, Maurice E. Finnequin, Verne C. Hampton and Frederick C. Ziem are running for the full term vacancies.

Candidates for the short term are Cooney and Theodore F. Hughes, and Heer.

Scheduled to appear before Bloomfield Hills Judge A. J. Richardson at 10 a.m. Saturday are: Tim David, 18, of 591 Woodway, Bloomfield township; Tim Fauncey, 18, of 2335 N. Pine Court, Orchard Lake; Robert Hills, 17, of 1082 Stratford lane, Bloomfield Hills; John Paige, 17, of 4300 Derry, Bloomfield township; John Jordan, 17, of 3148 Middlebelt, west Bloomfield township; Robert Barrett, 17, of 6014 Snow Shoe circle, Bloomfield township; Doug Danziger, 17, of 6325 Sheringham, Birmingham.

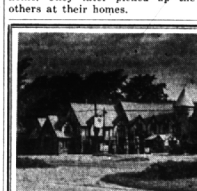
Birmingham City Commissioner William H. Burgum believes Birmingham's most important problem today is to maintain its high class residential nature.

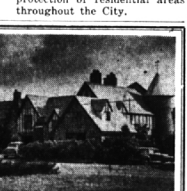
