Cambridge Woman To Head PTSA

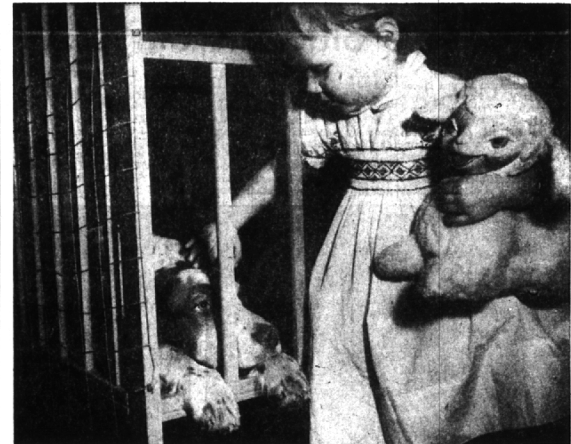
SOUTHFIELD — Mrs. Jean Clark of Cambridge Village was recently elected president of the Southfield high school PTSA for the coming year.
