200 Men Hear Talks On Space and Religion

Two hundred men from three local churches went "Out of This World" last week at a space travel-religion program sponsored by the First Presbyterian church.

Methodist men's clubs heard four prominent speakers speak on various phases of journeys into outer space. Dr. Jack Ryder, dean of engineering at Michigan State university, told of the problems encountered with a road mapping such flights.
