to go along with it," Reed said. Chloriding had not been started yet, Reed explained, because gravel must be added first, once weight restrictions are taken off roads.

Later there were protests that chloriding did not keep dust down, that residents would prefer chack holes to excessive dust and that "your graders have done us more harm than good."

"We are trying to build up some base by adding fill and gravel and keeping oil off the roads," said Village President Marvin Cline, explaining that the poor base now under most village roads is responsible for the spring muds and cave-ins.

"The village has guaranteed to keep the dust down," Cline assured the crowd. "If the chloriding doesn't work, we will do whatever it takes to get the dust down."

It's not a question of oil or chloride," said Cline. "It's a question of oil or road improvements."

ROAD COMMISSIONER Waldy Asbury later agreed to see that "if we can't get started with graveling this week, then we will go ahead and start calcium chloriding of Pierce and Westley this week."

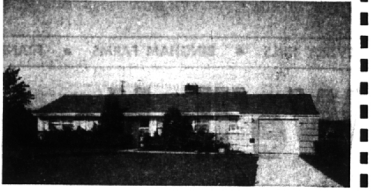
THE MEETING ENDED peacefully when one roadside dweller suggested, "We are all amateur roadbuilders here. Why don't we take the recommendation of the professional people?"

Asbury estimated after the meeting that chloriding of major roads such as Pierce would have to be done about every two weeks during the summer, to keep them dust-free.

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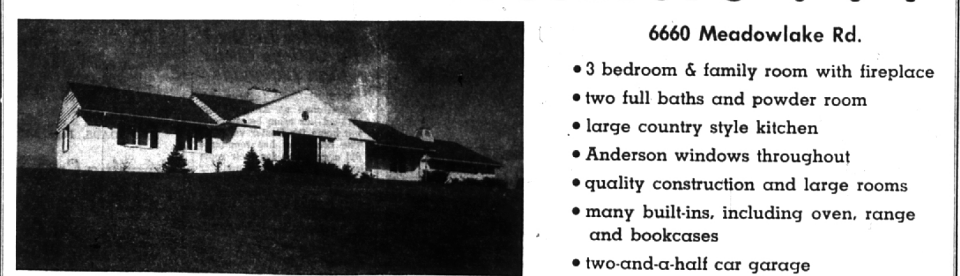
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
