## Franklin Councilmen 'Dream' at Meeting

FRANKLIN — Odds and ends from last week's agenda were disposed of readily Monday night and Franklin councilmen batted the breeze about things to come.

A first reading of a ditch eliminate control ordinance resulted in suggested changes to determine more stringent control over removal of blighted areas. Councilman Ed Thomas indicated a need for a clause which would specify whose responsibility it would be to enforce removal if property owners failed to comply with village regulations.

Proposed changes will be presented on the second reading set for May 11.

COUNCILMAN EUGENE KAWEKI's suggestion for an informal meeting with village businessmen regarding "mid-town" parking problems did very little to alter the pulse rate of his colleagues. It was generally agreed that the planning commission had adequate talent studying the situation.

The issue died when Councilman Edward Green asserted "I like the suggestion. It tends to slow up drivers who might otherwise zip through the village. I don't think we should do anything to encourage more business than we already have."

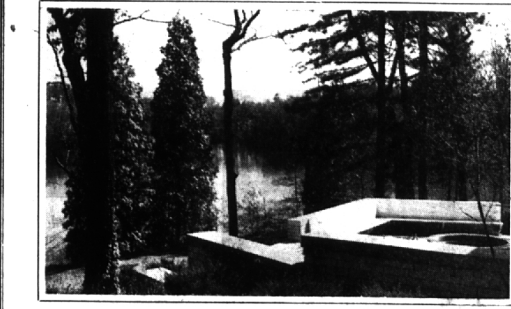
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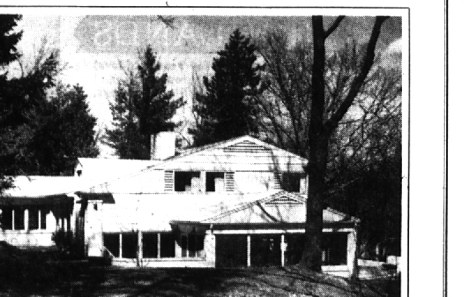
