

West Bloomfield Rules On Hunting, Swimming

WEST BLOOMFIELD—Residents of West Bloomfield township can breathe easier about two hazards of suburban living following last week's meeting of the township board.

A swimming pool safety ordinance was passed and first steps toward eliminating hunting in the township were taken.

The board unanimously requested the state legislature to pass a hunting act for West Bloomfield. A certified copy of their resolution has been given Farrell Roberts, state representative from the district, with the request that he introduce such a bill.

MORE THAN 40 township residents were present to urge passage of the resolution. Several cited instances where windows and

houses had been hit by stray hunting shot.

The swimming pool ordinance requires the fencing of swimming pools. Fences must be at least 42 inches high and so constructed that they cannot be climbed by small children. Pools also must meet building restriction requirements.

This was the first meeting of the newly constituted seven-man board. Sworn in by clerk Frank Hallett were recently elected members Walter Whitmer, Charles Forbes and John Ward.

Southfield to Ask 9 Families About Incorporation Choice

SOUTHFIELD—Southfield council agreed Monday to write to nine families in the 12-Mile-Lahser area requesting their views on possible annexation into Southfield or Beverly Hills village. The land is now considered part of the township.

State law permits annexation of the 11 lots to either the village or city by a joint resolution of the township board and the annexing body.

The Class A truck will be purchased for \$20,300 from the Sea-grave company of Colquhous, Ohio and will be the first of its kind in Michigan.

Police Apprehend Two Gunmen In Store Robbery

SOUTHFIELD—State Police nabbed the two gunmen who robbed the Epps Sporting Goods store leaving seven clerks and the manager bound with link chains.

Four pistols, a shotgun, a rifle and \$741 cash was taken.

The men, who are brothers, were identified by two witnesses who picked them out of a Detroit mug file. State Police Det. Robert Ruffile and Trooper Wesley Freeman apprehended the men, who gave up without a struggle although they were armed.

ALL THE WEAPONS and a small portion of the money was recovered.

The two men, James and Carl Bailey of Detroit, are being held by State Police on armed robbery charges. Southfield police assisted in the road block and search of the area.

New Lathrup Road Is Continuation Of Red River Drive

LATHRUP—Council members learned Monday from subdivision Charles D. Kelley that a new road had been planned in Lathrup.

At a conference with Robert Norris of the engineering firm of Ayres, Lewis, Norris and May, Kelley said, Norris and he had worked out the continuation of Red River drive through the undeveloped 54 acres in the northwest section of the city. The planned road will connect with the north end of Sunset boulevard.

ACCORDING TO Kelley, the arrangement will permit sewers to be placed through the property in the road plan.

However, City Attorney Everett Hayes warned the council that under the new Plat Act, dedication will mean that the city must build and maintain the road.

Hayes insisted that all the city needs at this time is an easement a deed to the road will be necessary.
