They found Puerto Rico to be a land of beauty while staying at the Caribe-Hilton. Among the many highlights of their trip, was there on the white sand beaches, witnessing the amusing goat races, the 50th state.

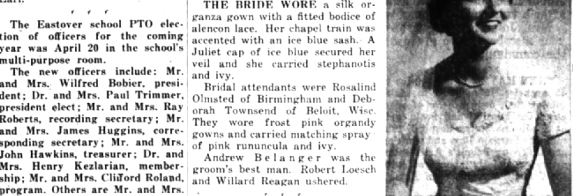
