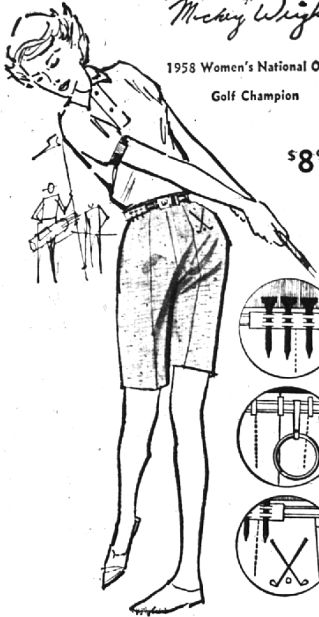

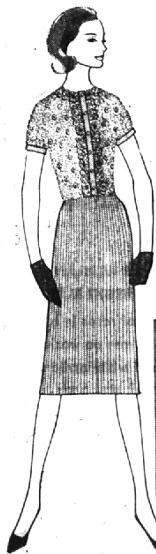

ear to his album, "Exotica."

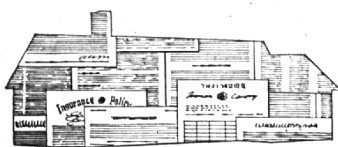
Jazz addicts take note of the

Cranbrook Gardens Opened to Public

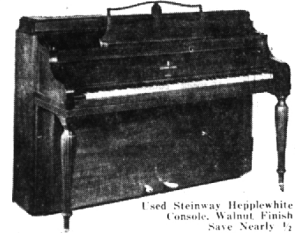
