Former congressman George Dondero will deliver the dedicatory address; presentation will be made by Exchange club member Edward Sawyer.

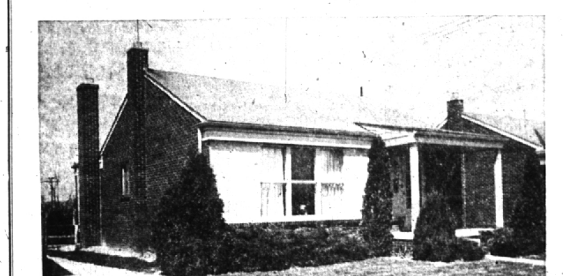
Principal Robert Hall will ac-knowledge the gift.

Man Robs Driver, Demands Ride

LATHRUP—For the seventh straight year, Lathrup property owners will pay the city’s maximum tax rate of \$7.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation on this year’s proposed budget.

Council members will meet with members of the Lathrup business and budget committee tonight to study the \$155,596 budget for 1959-60.

It was handed to council members April 29 by City Administrator Joseph Stone. The budget total is \$144,000 above the 1958-59 figure.

A public hearing on the budget is scheduled for May 11. Copies are now available at the city offices.

WHILE LAST year’s budget called for an expenditure of \$11,357, the budget for 1959-60 estimates \$125,596 in costs. The city expects to raise through property taxes about \$59,430, about \$2,000 more than last year. New building caused the rise.

Included in the new budget is a five per cent salary increase for all employees, and a \$500 raise from Stone’s present \$3,234 a year.

It also calls for a third paid policeman.

A breakdown of general ex-penditures includes \$34,335 for ad-ministration; building department, \$875; capital expenditures, \$12,000; public safety, \$53,410; sewer de-partment, \$4,500, plus \$22,776 in contingency reserve funds.

Right-of-way Abandonment Hearing May 5

LATHRUP—A continuation of the county road commission hearing on the 11 Mile road right-of-way abandonment has been set for May 5 at 9:30 a. m.

Lathrup and the City of South-field are opposing petitions from property owners along 11 Mile road which would add from 42 to 84 feet to the existing 20 by 100 foot lots, narrowing the present right-of-way.

Councilwoman Elizabeth Mitchell said Monday that she expected a decision by the road commission about two weeks after her testi-mony had been heard.
