

 ment and maintenance of its roads.  
 "There is a real need for on-the-job supervision of road maintenance work," Cline said.  
 Also included in the budget is a \$10,000 allocation for engineering studies of drains and other improvements needed, monies which the village will receive back eventually from property owners involved through special assessment districts.  
 Councilman Ted Shurtleiff, chairman of the village committee on public safety, said public safety officers would have their pay boosted to \$5300, sergeants would be raised from \$5000 to \$5850 annually, and the public safety director's new salary rate is \$7200.

**THE CLERK'S** assistant will be raised to a salary of \$3600 annually, with the clerk's pay remaining at the same figure.  
 During the village's first year, the public safety department's budget was \$71,745; general expenses \$12,000; clerk's office, \$8,985; financial, \$2,955; and council, \$2,500.  
 "I think that every department did an excellent job last year in holding to a minimum budget," Cline said this week.

 1) Adoption of a master thoroughfare plan, along with a planning consultant's study and preparatory work on a city master plan.  
 2) Adoption of ordinances regulating garbage and rubbish disposal and top soil removal, plus preliminary work on a multiple-dwelling ordinance. Revision and adoption of 20 additional ordinances.  
 3) Change of administrator, after the resignation Jan. 1 of Eugene Swen who was managing the city under a one-year contract, to a permanent, professional city administrator.

 Cogger explained Barry's plan to create a ditch wide and deep enough to carry water from the heavy rains that come about once in five years. New homes in the district might build up about in 20 years, according to Barry, to raise the \$4 million necessary to enclose the ditch, Cogger said.

**SUBDIVIDERS** CHARLES D. and Louise Lathrup Kelly have objected strenuously to the drain commissioner's plan. Because of their large land holdings in Lathrup the plan will, undoubtedly, be most costly to the Kellys. During previous council meetings Mr. and Mrs. Kelly have objected to the ditch as a playground hazard, a highway danger, a danger to swimming children, a nuisance, and because it would eat up and depreciate property values.

**KELLEY** HAS always contended that a simple 600' diameter of the stream would be adequate to promote the flow of water.  Many residents complained when the village insisted on chloride, holding that it would eventually cause a break-up of road bases being built up in the present grading program.  
 On roads where graveling or other improvement is not slated this year, village officials have agreed that oil or chloriding can be used, at residents' option. The roads are: Woodhaven, 14 Mile west of Lahser, Sunnyslope, N o r w o o d, Evergreen from the school's north line to Riversdale, Kirkshire from Pierce to Madison, and Birchwood from Pierce to Edgewood.
