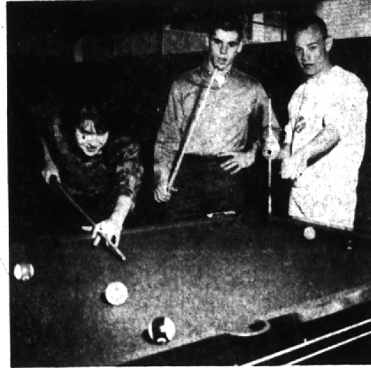
Birmingham Teen Center Grand Opening Nears

10 B'ham Streets To Receive New Blacktop Surfaces

A \$56,400 asphaltic street resurfacing program is planned for this summer, Birmingham City Engineer Grover Serenbetsky has reported to the city commission. He said an additional \$41,200 would be spent on the present strip pavements when portions of Eton and Lincoln widened.

IN THE LARGER program will be included these 10 streets:

Bates, Brown to Lincoln and Maple to Willets; Bloomfield court; Brownell, Forest to Maple; Daines, Purdy to Woodward; Eton, Yosemite to Maple; Forest, Woodward to Brownell; George, Pierce to Woodward; Hazel, Woodward to Hunter; Lincoln, Woodward to Adams; Townsend, Bates to Southfield.

Eton, Webster to Yosemite, and Lincoln, Pierce to Southfield, are the proposed stretches for widening.

City Manager L. R. Gare said a similar resurfacing program next year would see just about every old permanent city street with a new topping.

Serenbetsky also recommended Sheffield street be given at least a first layer of resurfacing to save what pavement is there. He suggests it be widened before the final top is placed.
