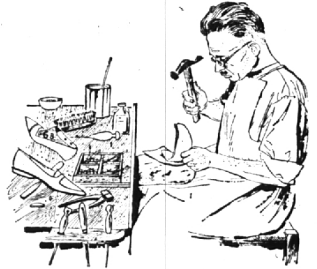
puppets and marionettes is invited to bring their children to see the showing of "The Three Pies," a short puppet play.

They Laughed When Goldovsky Sat Down...

The Village Women's club assembled last Wednesday at the Community House to hear the celebrated pianist-lecturer Boris Goldovsky. He has long held sway as the witty and well-informed moderator of Metropolitan Opera broadcast intermissions.

Informality was coupled with a fine command of piano literature and technique, in his interesting and colorful presentation. There was very little formal design to the afternoon's proceedings, but whether Goldovsky was recalling some humorous childhood incident, or drawing his audience's attention to some little-known fact in musical history, it was done with warmth and ease and obvious affection for his subject.

His wit sometimes bordered on the puckishness of Victor Borge. In fact the two men have much in common. They are both fine pianists—well schooled and thorough musicians who, refusing to take themselves too seriously, avoid the pompous and leave lots of room for enjoyment.

GOLDOVSKY not only regaled his audience with quips and anecdotes from his personal life and the lives of famous musical per-

sonalities, but he also played during the course of the afternoon a well-balanced program of piano music. Included were an early sonata by Scarlatti, a chorale-prelude by Bach, and a difficult and exciting arrangement of a Strauss waltz by Erno Dohnanyi.

Goldovsky must not be judged merely as a pianist, but in that very difficult role of pianist-lecturer. A perhaps less than retail-level of perfection in playing was compensated by the dynamic force of his whole personality that transmitted with such warmth and candor the extent of his devotion to music.

He made sure that everyone in the audience recognized that music for him has not only been a means of livelihood but has been throughout his life, the one dependable, never-changing reality.

B'ham Planner Making Survey

Birmingham City Planner Herbert Herzberg left Tuesday to make a survey of the downtown improvement program being carried on in several southern Michigan cities.

He is making the survey as the result of a request made by plan board members at a special committee meeting Saturday morning. The plan board asked him to make the survey to determine how many of these programs have worked in other cities, how they were initiated and how they were financed.

HERZBERG SAID the main reason for the survey was to "enable the plan board to analyze the situation so they could ask the city commission for an appropriation from next year's budget."

He will present a report of his survey to the plan board at its regular meeting, April 15, at 8 p.m. at the Municipal building.

At that time Herzberg will also recommend one of two ways of getting a comprehensive plan for Birmingham's central business district.

One plan would be to have himself, the plan board and outside help such as draftsmen and legmen draw up a plan. Under the second plan, a planning consultant would be hired.

HERZBERG will survey such cities as Kalamazoo, Grand Rapids and Royal Oak to determine the best types of programs and the most reasonable.

He will talk to city planners, officials, merchants and Chamber of Commerce members, and if possible, will take pictures of plans and improvements.

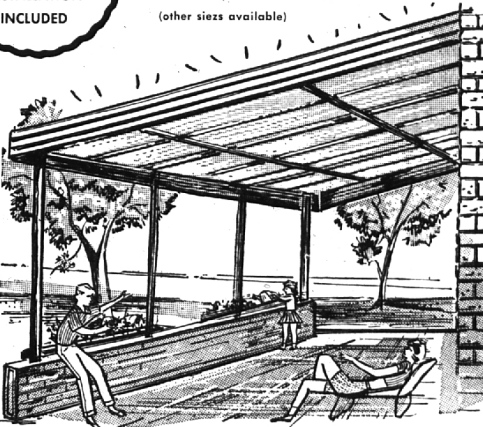
Dr. Ormond will illustrate his talk with slides taken while he was chief of the department of Otolaryngology at Miraj, India, from 1952 to 1955.

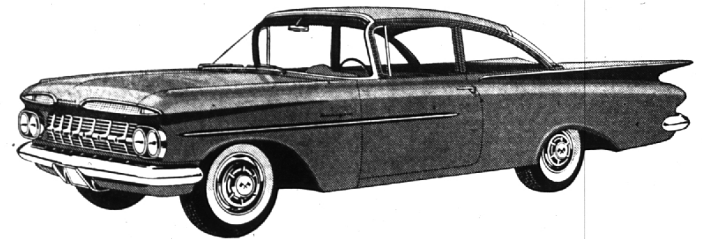
