Dearborn Center Has Natural Advantages, Says U-M's Stirton

The University of Michigan's new Dearborn Center will capitalize on one of the great assets of the southeastern Michigan area, U-M Vice President William E. Stirton said in Birmingham Wednesday.

This asset is the availability of key industrial and business assignments which can be used for the work-study or co-operative part of the center's educational program.

Stirton, who is director of the Dearborn Center, outlined the educational opportunities to be available on the 210-acre site given by the Ford Motor Company in four buildings constructed with \$6,500,000 given by Ford Motor Company Fund. The meeting was last night at the Birmingham Community House.

SINCE THE Southeastern Michigan area is well equipped with colleges to provide the freshmen and sophomore years, he said the Dearborn Center would be a "senior unit" providing courses only at the junior, senior and graduate levels in engineering, business administration and in the liberal arts and sciences.

The programs in engineering and business administration, he said, would be the only ones initially to alternate between 12-week periods on the campus at Dearborn and on specific work assignments in business and industry.

These two areas, he reported, were the ones which industry had indicated that their greatest manpower needs were centered.

"It is important to note that these work assignments in business and industry will be reviewed carefully for their instructional content and there will be prerequisites for taking courses in the classroom or laboratory," Stirton said.

HE SAID IT is hoped that as the program at the Dearborn Center develops that the opportunity will arise to extend the co-operative program to include the liberal arts and sciences.

There also will be a program leading to the Master's degree in business administration, engineering and the liberal arts and sciences with plans for future graduate work at more advanced levels.

In addition there will be an extensive program in the extension adult education type of activity which will be housed in Fair Lane, the home of the late Henry Ford. Stirton said these programs will be of varying characteristics depending on the need.

"Some will be credit courses some non-credit while some will be seminars and conferences," Stirton added. "They will be met in the late afternoon, evenings and on Saturdays."

ADMISSION requirements will be the same as for admission to the campus at Ann Arbor. The Dearborn Center will be strictly a "commuters college" since there will be no on-campus housing for students.

The academic calendar also will differ from the one in use at Ann Arbor. The quarter-system rather than the semester plan will be used and there will be four 12-week periods scheduled on a year-around basis.

Stirton said interested students may request an application blank from the Admissions Office, Administration Building, The University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. Prospective applicants also are invited to discuss their plans in person with admissions counselors in Ann Arbor.

"Visitors to the Dearborn Center will be welcome," Stirton said. "Arrangements are being made so that the facilities will be open to interested persons on Sunday afternoons this spring. Special arrangements also can be made thru my office."
