Voter Survey Results Given by Broomfield

WASHINGTON—Oakland County residents overwhelming ly oppose our Nation's farm subsidy program and favor a balanced Federal budget, said Congressman William S. Broomfield (R-Oakland county) today.

Broomfield said the results of a survey of voter opinion mailed to more than 12,000 Eighteenth district homes also indicated that residents favor a 12-cent a gallon gasoline tax increase "if necessary" to build new highways, and strongly back Broomfield's proposal to increase the limit on outside earnings for those receiving social security to \$3,000 from the present \$1,200 ceiling.

More than 25 percent replied to the questionnaire, "a much greater percentage than I expected," said Broomfield. "This is the first time that a Congressional poll has been tried in my district, and I am very satisfied with the results. I intend to continue the practice in the future."

AREAS WERE carefully selected to insure a fair cross-section of voter opinion in the county with-out regard to party affiliation.

On most issues, Oakland county residents strongly backed the items in President Eisenhower's \$7,000,000,000 billion proposed Federal budget. But opinion split almost evenly on Federal aid for school reconstruction, aid to depressed areas, and payments to the high-way building fund.

Almost two out of three who replied indicated they were willing to pay for extra Federal programs through increased taxes, rather than through any further increase in our National debt. More than 62 percent indicated they are willing to pay extra gasoline taxes if such action would mean better roads.

A freer flow of political leaders,

students, farmers and businessmen between the United States and Russia was favored by 69 percent of those who answered. Seventy-two percent opposed Federal fair-trade laws, while 57 percent were against raising the minimum wage above the present \$1 an hour.

ONLY 33.7 PERCENT favored a trial test for paid television, while only 27.1 percent wanted extra funds to be provided for veterans' hospital facilities.

Opinion ran strongly against any increases over the President's request for aids to housing, "soil bank," increased payment to the Civil Service retirement fund, postal subsidy, aids to mineral industries, community facilities, and airports.

A large number of those who replied said they were pleased with the questionnaire method of finding out voter opinions on national issues, said Broomfield.

"THE ANSWERS have certainly been a great help to me," he said. "They have given me a good sampling of the feelings of those I represent on matters which affect our people's pocketbooks."

Broomfield said he wants to compliment these in Oakland county who answered the questionnaires for their "excellent response, their keen grasp of our Nation's problems, and for proposing some very worthwhile solutions to these problems."
