Southfield News Briefs

Plan to Release Highway Route 'Within a Year'

SOUTHFIELD—State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie told Southfield highway committee in a special meeting recently that the city would know "within a year" where the eastern extension of the proposed east-west expressway would cut through the city.

Mackie made his promise to Southfield in an attempt to get approval for the western extension of the expressway from Grand River to Telegraph. It is the only section of Mackie's five-year building program not approved yet by incorporated communities involved.

The city has refused to approve the western section until eastern extension plans were revealed. After the promise from the highway commissioner, the city's highway committee has given "conditional consent" to the western portion.

Superintendent Authorized to Help Architects, Board

SOUTHFIELD—Southfield school board authorized Superintendent Glen Schoenhaus Monday evening to work with architects and the Southfield library board on changes to be made in the Brooks school.

The two room school, which will not be needed by the Southfield school district this fall, is to be rented to the city of Southfield for a period of three years at \$100 per month.

Mrs. Sol Siegal, 19455 Addison, chairman of the library board said Monday evening that the library is scheduled to be opened about January 1. Changes in the building will start after Sept. 1, Mrs. Siegal said.

Township Tax Rate Reduced By 33 Cents

SOUTHFIELD—The 1955 township tax rate was set at 67 cents per \$1000 of equalized value Tuesday night at the township board meeting. This figure represents a reduction of 33 cents over last year's rate. The total county school and township tax is now \$44.48 per \$1000 assessed valuation, a reduction of \$2.12.

Final action was taken on a joint resolution dividing the assets of the Southfield township water department between the City of Southfield and the village of Beverly Hills.

Bond and interest funds were placed in escrow to provide payment for water revenue bonds and a resolution passed that water collections after June 30 in the north of the city should be turned over to Beverly Hills.

In other business the board authorized an additional \$132 to be added to the building contract to cover the cost of a new culvert and repair work on the existing roof. The purchase of screens for the new addition was also authorized.

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
