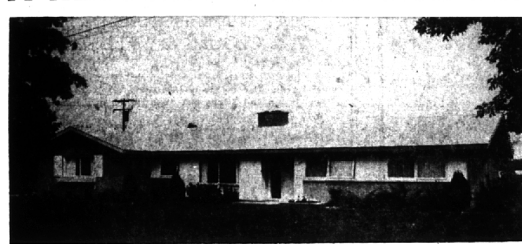

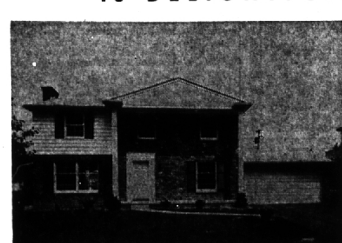

Road Must Be Kept Clear, Attorney Says

LATHRUP—City Attorney Everett Hayes told Lathrup council members Monday evening that he had taken a close look at the front portion of Quentin street and that three evergreen trees and one post must be removed from the right of way.

In order to prevent adverse possession, Hayes said, the platred road must be kept clear.

Adjoining property owners along the one block strip had about a year ago, requested the city to vacate the property but council members said at that time, that they had no right to vacate, sell or give away city property for private use.

Hayes will supplement his original decision in the matter and City Administrator Donald D. Stone will write a letter to property owners asking them to remove or transplant the trees, otherwise it will be necessary for the city to remove the trees.

Interceptor Costs Concern Lathrup Council Members

LATHRUP—Worried Lathrup council members talked Evergreen Interceptor costs Monday evening and how to raise \$10,802.99 payments coming up every year. In all probability, they agreed, the special assessment will have to be added to July 1969 tax bills to meet a payment due in April 1961. Added to the burden of interceptor costs, the city faces a payment of about \$5,000 yearly for sewage treatment. Sewage will be treated at the interceptor at 11 Mile and Evergreen roads.

BECAUSE the \$5,000 will be a water department collection, Councilman David P. Anderson suggested that the charge could be spread to residents over a winter usage period from October to March rather than summer when lawns are watered and large meters add high water usage totals. Another possibility considered by the council is an extra charge to residents who have not or cannot disconnect downspouts. Rainwater flowing into the sanitary sewer lines will add costs to the city at the sewage metering station.
