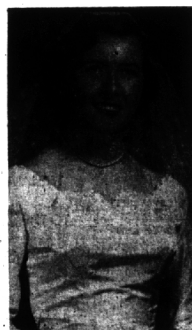

The program is being conducted to house students taking an orientation course at Cranbrook before leaving for Ann Arbor and a year's study at the University of Michigan.

Chairman of the Birmingham-Bloomfield group is Mrs. Sylvester Trythall, who is in charge of calling residents in the area to see if they have room to house one or more of the students.

The orientation program at Cranbrook will be conducted by Dr. James M. Davis, director of the University's International Center.

THE PROGRAM is designed to help the foreign students adjust to academic and social life on the campus. It also will enable them to better understand their American classmates.

"Students from overseas come here with a very distorted conception of family life in this country," Dr. Davis said. "Being welcomed informally into a home almost immediately upon arrival will not only make the students feel wanted, but will give them a picture of us as we really are."

UPON ARRIVAL at Ann Arbor on Thursday, Sept. 12, the students will take an English placement test

at the University Friday morning. "Host" families will pick their visitors up between 4:30 and 5 p.m. Friday, take them home for dinner and at 9:30 a.m. Saturday morning, the students will be taken to Cranbrook.

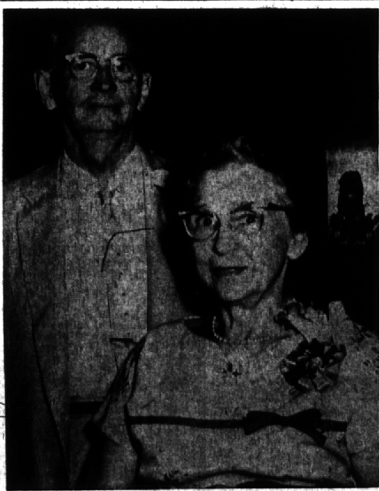
Discussions and lectures will take up the greater part of the day along with a tour of Cranbrook and a buffet luncheon.

They will be returned to their American homes for Saturday night dinners and will remain at the homes till 1 p.m. Sunday.

ON SUNDAY, the students will tour Dearborn, the U. of M. campus there, have lunch at the Ford mansion and proceed to Ann Arbor.

Careful planning on the part of the hosts will be evidenced by the letters being sent to the homes. Mrs. Norris A. Host, 18985 Bedford, Birmingham, last year's chairman, is sending the letters with recommendations on how to make the student feel at home.
