CRANBROOK — Independent School teachers from seven states will meet at Cranbrook School, Aug. 30 to Sept. 3, for a Forum on "The Conquest of Inner Space." Jointly sponsored by Cranbrook school and the Council for religion in Independent Schools of New York city, the forum will consider deeper educational needs. Dr. Kenneth Building, professor of economics at the University of Michi-

gan and author of "The Image," is Dean of the forum. Dr. Donald H. Andrews, professor of chemistry at the John Hopkins University in Baltimore, represents the natural sciences. The Rev. Dr. Perry LeFevre, associate professor of theology and education at the University of Chicago and author of "The Christian Teacher," will present the insights of psychology on adolescent nature. Addresses by these men are open to the public on payment of a \$2.00 registration fee. Those interested may call Harry D. Hoey, Headmaster of Cranbrook, at the school.

Being a student at Birmingham high, I have become quite concerned with the controversy over its name. It seems that this column has been open to any discussion and I feel that the students should take an interest and express their opinion on the subject.

There have been numerous petitions presented to the School Board stating that the people of Birmingham do not wish the name of their school to be changed.

DOES THE BOARD have so much power that they are able to take a step this big against the wishes of those people it concerns? Five classes have graduated from a comparatively new high school known as Birmingham and now someone has taken it on himself to violate this tradition. We have elected a fine school board and I know we are all very proud of it but by taking a step like this the board would have to take with it a lot of our money; money that would be used to change plaques and titles, class rings and all the other accessories that belong to our school. Money that should be used to repair the roof that leaks in the study hall, money that should be used to furnish our library with more books to improve our literary rating, money that should be used to put into operation the air-conditioning system that has never been used.

I submit this respectfully, suggesting that a vote be taken to settle the question. That way, whatever is to be done will contain the majority of the citizens. I join Carole Gregory and Fraser Cox and all of you who feel strongly about this issue. If we are to keep the name of our high school we must let the board know exactly how we stand.
